Thirteen exceptional individuals and 84 health facilities in Nairobi County were recently recognized and awarded for their outstanding efforts in enhancing the quality of healthcare services at this the 2023 Health Service Delivery Awards.

Mbagathi Hospital emerged the top level five hospital in the county, with Njiru Hospital named best Level 4 Hospital, Embakasi Health Center for the best Level 3 facility and Huruma Lions Dispensary as best Level 2.

In its fifth year the ceremony was Presided over by Nairobi Governor Hon. Sakaja Johnson as he celebrated

the 84 health facilities across the county for their outstanding contributions to healthcare service delivery. The facilities were awarded based on their respective levels, acknowledging the positive transformations and improvements experienced in public health facilities across the county.

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Health Service Delivery Awards

Lengo Health Centre was also honored as the most improved facility in the County and Embakasi Health Center was also awarded for its commitment to the implementation of Quality Improvement. When celebrating the health facilities across the county he called on the staff to remain client focused. He expressed his heartfelt appreciation to the health workers for their tireless dedication and unwavering commitment to improving healthcare services in Nairobi County.

Nairobi Is Open For Business, Governor Sakaja Tells French Investors

Nairobi City County Governor Sakaja A. Johnson has called on French investors to partner with Nairobi City County to facilitate growth especially in infrastructure development.

Governor Sakaja assured the investors that the county government has put in place robust measures to improve the business environment in the county to enhance private investments.

Speaking at Ambition Africa in Paris, France, discussing African cities and urban mobility, Governor Sakaja stressed that Nairobi, like many regional hubs in emerging markets, has a rapidly expanding population and the city's infrastructure struggles to keep pace. One challenge that this creates is traffic, which means a large amount of time is spent in the numerous tailbacks that occur in and around the city but

through construction of the Expressway and the planned BRT system will ease the road traffic snarl.

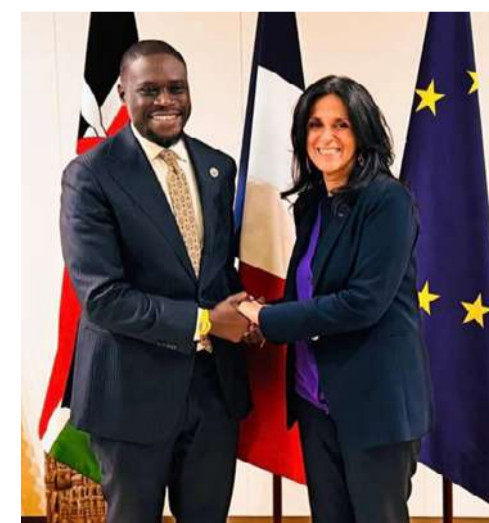
"While the main aim of the Expressway was to ease traffic congestion on Mombasa Road and create a direct route between the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport and Westlands, the line is something more than just a super-highway and restores or bring about all the advantages of accessibility to developers, investors, and residents" Governor Sakaja said

He also noted that Public-private partnerships that involve collaboration between a government agency and a private-sector company is used to finance, build, and operate projects, such as public transportation networks, parks, and convention centers. Financing a project through a public-private partnership enables projects to be completed sooner or make it a possibility in the first place.

The French Government has committed

to build the BRT Line 3.

Governor Sakaja was on an official visit in Paris, France meeting with various leaders and organisations. He also represented the President at the Schools Coalition opening ceremony.

Mbagathi Hospital's Remarkable Journey



Mbagathi Hospital has been going through a transformation and more so has become a beacon of hope for fragile newborns in need of specialized care with the opening of the Newborn Unit (NBU), which includes a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) with 48 incubators.

On a daily basis, the unit accommodates 70-80 patients, primarily from nearby informal settlements. Mr. Alexander Irungu Wanjiru, the hospital's Chief Executive Officer said: "The framework of Mbagathi Hospital's operation is firmly rooted in the Governor's manifesto, dedicated to upholding dignity and instilling hope in the hearts of Nairobi's residents".

The NBU offers a range of critical services, including newborn nursery, special care, and neonatal intensive care. It boasts essential medical equipment such as ventilators, non-invasive bypass ventilators, portable ultrasound machines, monitors, and defibrillators. In preparation for the unit's expansion, a robust recruitment and skills training program for nurses is underway in collaboration with Kenyatta University Referral Hospital.

The hospital's commitment to enhancing healthcare extends beyond its NBU. An 8-bed capacity Intensive Care Unit (ICU), nearing completion, is poised to become the second county public ICU, reflecting the

county's plan to bolster healthcare infrastructure and ensure effective service delivery.

The hospital is also working in collaboration with various stakeholders to establish a Nutritional Centre of Excellence, prioritizing the well-being of residents in neighboring informal settlements like Kibra. "We have partnered with various stakeholders," highlighted Mr. Irungu, "to establish a Nutritional Centre of Excellence at our facility, aligning with Governor Sakaja Johnson's vision and fostering a collaborative health agenda with like-minded partners."

Mbagathi Hospital serves a significant number of patients daily, catering to approximately 1100-1200 outpatients and an average of about 450 inpatients within a 24-hour period. Mr. Irungu reiterated the hospital's commitment to maintaining a steady supply of medical essentials, underlining the collaboration with esteemed institutions like Kenyatta University and Kenyatta National Hospital to address potential specialist shortages.








Moreover, Mbagathi Hospital is devising revenue-generating strategies, including the creation of an Independent Pharmacy Account, to sustain essential services. These initiatives showcase the hospital's dedication to providing quality healthcare and attracting collaborative partnerships that prioritize the county's well-being.

As the world marks Cancer Awareness Month, Dr. Erica, leading the oncology department, highlighted the hospital's proactive approach to public awareness and health screenings. The hospital plans to deploy simple pin balloons at strategic locations to ignite conversations and initiate cervical cancer screening, epitomizing their commitment to community health.

Mbagathi Hospital's evolution into a center of excellence signifies and reaffirms the County Government's commitment to healthcare excellence for all.

ENHANCING NAIROBI COUNTY'S RESILIENCE AND DISASTER PREPAREDNESS



His Excellency Governor Sakaja A. Johnson has demonstrated a steadfast commitment to addressing potential health and safety hazards associated with disasters. This commitment aligns with Governor Johnson's vision of restoring order, hope, and dignity in the lives of all Nairobian, guaranteeing their well-being and safeguarding their properties.

A cornerstone of this preparedness effort is the formation of a multi-sectoral task force with a clear mission: to develop tailored plans for specific sectors and sub-counties, aimed at managing, mitigating, and preventing the impact of potential disasters. Additionally, the deployment of 3500 green army soldiers is a

groundbreaking initiative, not only mitigating youth unemployment but also fortifying readiness for the anticipated heavy rains.

Historically, Nairobi City County has been plagued by flooding due to the strain on drainage systems caused by an ever-growing population. Factors contributing to this problem include clogged drainage systems, unauthorized construction obstructing waterways, and mismanagement of solid waste.

To tackle these imminent risks, the green army soldiers are tirelessly working round the clock to unclog drainage systems, significantly reducing the chances of sewer overflows when the rains arrive.

Mr. Bramuel Simiyu, Chief Officer of Disaster Management and Coordination for Nairobi City County and Chair of the Multi-Sectoral El-Nino Mitigation Team, expressed confidence in the county's preparedness. He stated that their department and the task force have implemented measures not only to respond to disasters but to proactively mitigate and prevent them. He emphasized, "Our strategy is not solely about mitigating the effects of El-nino rains but also ensuring that Nairobian can reside in a secure environment where their lives and properties are safeguarded."

Furthermore, Mr. Simiyu provided insight into the comprehensive plan, explaining, "As Kenya's capital city, Nairobi City County aspires to have a robust, consistent, and reliable disaster response strategy that stands on par with the best cities worldwide. We also encourage Nairobian to consider disaster

management as a personal responsibility by avoiding drainage dumping and cooperating with authorities, particularly those residing in riverine areas when required."

In keeping with a proactive approach, disaster-prone areas have been meticulously identified by the county's Environment sector. The ongoing unclogging of drainage systems aims to ensure the uninterrupted flow of water, mitigating blockages and reducing the risk of flooding.

This resilience strategy underscores the county's dedication to proactive disaster preparedness, guaranteeing the safety and well-being of its residents in the face of any potential disaster.

Prioritizing Healthcare in 2023/24 Budget



Since taking office, Governor Sakaja A. Johnson of Nairobi has consistently underscored his unwavering commitment to healthcare as a top priority. He is dedicated to the transformation of Nairobi County into a place where every resident can readily access high-quality healthcare services. The recently approved budget for FY 2023/2024 stands as a testament to this commitment, with a substantial allocation to the Health, Wellness, and Nutrition Sector. The County Government has allocated Kshs. 7,071,303,336 for recurrent

Kshs. 7,071,303,336 for recurrent expenses and an additional Kshs. 1,129,000,000 for development expenditures within the healthcare sector. This allocation marks a significant milestone in the County Government's mission to enhance healthcare services for the citizens of Nairobi. Notably, out of the recurrent expenses, Kshs. 400 million has been designated for equipping existing medical facilities and the procurement of medicines and non-pharmaceuticals for all county health facilities.

Furthermore, the noteworthy

allocation of Ksh 1.1 billion for development expenditure will enable the county government to construct, refurbish, and equip healthcare facilities across various parts of the city. Over the past six months, the county government has accelerated its development initiatives, striving to elevate the standard of healthcare services and instill hope and dignity in the people of Nairobi. While resources have been evenly distributed to all regions, special attention have been devoted to level 4 county hospitals, specifically Pumwani Mama Lucy, Mutuini, and Mbagathi Hospitals.

Mama Lucy Hospital has recently undergone a remarkable transformation, solidifying its status as one of the nation's most reliable healthcare establishments. The hospital's CEO has inaugurated Mama Lucy Umoja 2 Eye Hospital, showcasing the county government's commitment to expanding the level 5 hospital to meet the evolving healthcare needs of Nairobi Residents. Ongoing renovations at the facility are paving the way for the establishment of a 30-bed orthopedic ward and a state-of-the-art theatre. Notably, Mama Lucy has also introduced an Orthopedic Trauma Centre.

These transformative developments are echoing throughout all other Level-5 hospitals as the Health, Wellness, and Nutrition Sector tirelessly strives to provide the people of Nairobi with top-notch healthcare services. For instance, Pumwani recently welcomed a high

capacity power backup generator to ensure uninterrupted service delivery in the face of unforeseen power outages. Furthermore, Mbagathi Hospital has partnered with AMREF to construct an advanced oxygen piping facility.

In essence, the substantial investments made in various healthcare facilities by the Nairobi City County Government will undoubtedly play a pivotal role in fulfilling Governor Sakaja's pledge of granting all citizens access to universal, high-quality healthcare.

Nairobi County Empowers Community Health Promoters Through A Stipend Programme



In a significant stride towards enhancing community health services, the Nairobi City County has taken a historic step by acknowledging and supporting its 7,460 Community Health Promoters (CHPs) through a stipend program. Previously referred to as community health volunteers, these individuals were not eligible for any payment as they were not recognized by the county laws, despite being the backbone of community care, providers of essential health services and trusted sources of information within their communities.

Governor Sakaja, recognizing the pivotal role played by CHPs, unveiled a stipend program aimed at motivating and supporting them, ultimately elevating the quality of community health services. "When I assumed

office, CHPs were not receiving their stipends. However, I have ensured they receive a monthly stipend of KShs. 3, 500, with plans underway to increase it to KShs. 6, 000," affirmed the County boss.

CHPs play a central role in alleviating the burden on health facilities' staff and referral hospitals, offering critical health services and valuable health information. Moreover, they help bridge health disparities in underserved communities, contributing significantly to containing diseases and promoting the overall health of county dwellers.

Governor Sakaja emphasized the importance of investing in community health by equipping CHPs with the necessary tools and gadgets to

facilitate effective communication with health professionals in various health facilities throughout the city.

Acknowledging the potential of digitization in advancing healthcare, the County Boss highlighted the ongoing digitization of community health promoters' services. This initiative aims to enhance health record keeping, patient tracking, and record retrieval systems, ultimately ensuring efficient healthcare delivery.

The Governor expressed gratitude to CHPs for their dedication in creating vital connections between vulnerable populations and healthcare systems. Their efforts in data gathering at the community level and facilitating navigation of healthcare and social service systems are instrumental in serving the public.

Mary Njeri, a community health promoter, echoed the sentiments of

her colleagues, expressing immense gratitude for the stipend that will significantly enhance their ability to serve their communities effectively.

Governor Sakaja announced a joint effort between the national and county governments to support community health workers, emphasizing their critical role in advancing Universal Health Coverage. Both levels of government have agreed to standardize the remuneration of community health promoters, demonstrating a united front in prioritizing community health despite healthcare being a devolved function.

This recognition and empowerment of Community Health Promoters by the Nairobi City County underscores the commitment to prioritize public health and community care for the residents of Nairobi County and beyond.

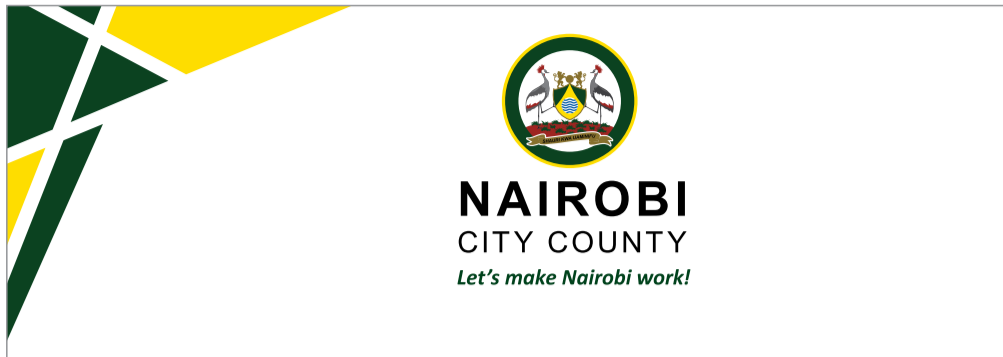
The County Government will hereafter publish a comprehensive schedule of all fees and charges contained in this Act and previous Finance Acts in one document for ease of reference by Nairobian.

Members of the Nairobi City County Assembly unanimously passed the Bill on Thursday 12th October 2023, reflecting a unified commitment to the County's growth and development agenda.

The Finance Act, which was subject to extensive public participation process involving over 17 consultations in every sub-County, garnered resounding support from the city's residents.

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The valuable input received during public participation influenced amendments to the proposed Act and adjusted certain charges and levies in the county. Several charges were also reduced after public participation, while a few others were maintained.

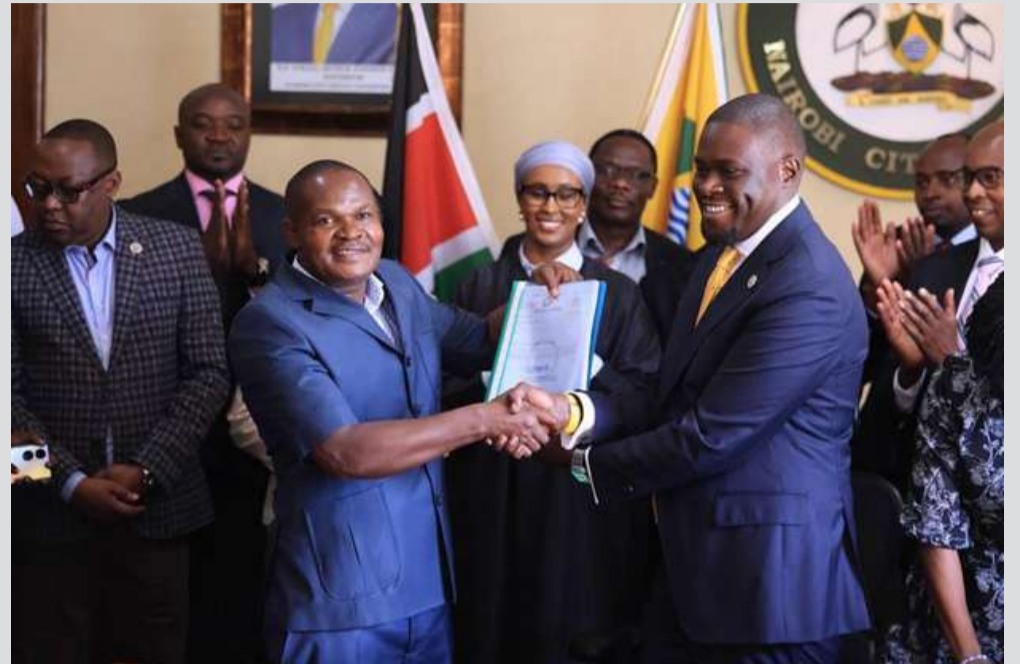
Speaking after he assented to the Bill, Governor Sakaja expressed confidence that the new Act would significantly benefit the people while also enabling the County to undertake key priority projects.

“The Finance Act 2023 is good for the County Government and also good for the residents. We gathered valuable insights during this public engagement process. These insights played a vital role in shaping the Bill, resulting in certain charges being increased, reduced, or maintained, aligning them with the interests and needs of both the public and the County Government,” Governor Sakaja said.

The Nairobi City County Finance Bill 2023 aims to introduce openness, accountability, and equity in taxation while expanding revenue sources, addressing environmental issues, and enhancing service delivery.

Some of the Key highlights of the Nairobi City County Finance Act 2023 include:

- Market stalls: We initially proposed 30% levies and charges on the market stalls. However, after public participation, the charges were revised to a moderate 10% increment.
- Alcoholic drinks and licensing: The proposal to raise charges on alcoholic drinks and licensing was adopted to help control the number of drinking outlets across the County.
- City inspectorate: The impounding charges were retained in some areas and reduced in others to drive compliance.
- Outdoor advertisement and signage: We increased application fees for outdoor advertising.
- Physical planning, land, and housing: We had proposed to increase rent by 25% but following consultations we have only increased by 10%.
- Public health services: We had initially proposed new charges on Reproductive health but, during the public participation, the public expressed their views and we heard and maintained and reduced some of the charges.
- Market services: We had proposed to increase charges but following



the recommendations we have retained the old charges.

- Parking. The new law introduces new parking zones that are well defined, with new charges introduced for the registration of taxis and boda-bodas.
- Alternative Provision of Basic Education and Training (APBET) Schools we have reduced their annual fee from Ksh10,000 to Ksh3,000 which can be paid every term.

Governor Sakaja committed to prudent financial management and assured

Nairobi residents that the anticipated Kshs.20 billion in own-source revenue would be applied prudently for strategic development purposes.

The focus will be on the development of stadiums, the school feeding program, medical facilities, and the creation of employment opportunities, including the Green Army.

The Nairobi City County Finance Act 2023 demonstrates the dedication of the County Government to responsibly manage financial resources and prioritize initiatives that directly impact the lives of its residents.
